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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Admissions Office experienced an extremely busy year during 2006/2007. Activities and events included recruitment travel, file reviews, interviewing, two PreCOM Programs, THE COMrade program, the revision of publications/Health and Technical Standards/web sites, facilitating criminal background checks, and facilitating the Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship Program (SURF). In addition, the Admissions staff has been active with professional presentations and achievements. One of the most exciting events of the 2006/2007 year included the institutionalization and incorporation of the Summer Scholars Program into the Admissions Office. The addition of the Summer Scholars programming to the Admissions Office included the addition of new personnel to the staff. The Assistant Director for Multicultural Recruitment, Ms. Tish Lyte, is responsible for the Summer Scholars, MCAT Prep and is active with student recruitment. Additional personnel issues kept the office very busy as we made, and continue to make, adjustments to the Admissions Office team.

Highlights from the recruitment activity summary include 108 campus visits, including 31 HBCU/minority programs, 61 tour and counseling sessions on the OU-COM campus, and a total of 3,941 student contacts. A detailed account of recruitment programs can be found in Appendix A of this report. Additional recruitment activities included the Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship program, Summer Scholars program and mailings to the April 2006 MCAT test takers. The Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship Program (SURF) continues to be an effective recruitment tool and had /have six participants in both 2006 and 2007. Outcome information regarding the SURF program can be found on page 4. Summer Scholars continues to be an integral pipeline that perpetuates the diversity at OU-COM. There were 23 participants this year and outcome information can be found on page .3

The admissions cycle for the 2007 entering class culminated with the receipt of 3,173 processed applications to the college, representing a 13.8% increase from the 2006 admission year. The class of 2010 set a record for the highest science GPA and over-all GPA in college history. The Class of 2011 is very diverse and academically accomplished. The class is 23% minority, 17% are from Appalachian counties in Ohio, 55% are women and a new record was set for science and over-all GPA. Detailed information about the 2005/2006 and 2006/2007 application cycles and year to year comparison data can be found on page .

The pre-matriculation activities, designed to enhance student engagement and insight into the college, have been very positive. Activities included mailing traditional letters and an enhanced electronic discussion board for accepted students to the college, and the COMrade program. In addition, two PreCOM programs were conducted, March 10 and April 21, 2007, to improve communication to accepted students and increase the yield of matriculates. Detailed information about this program can be found on page of this report. The Admissions Office continues to work closely with the Ohio University Police Department to coordinate and implement criminal background checks for the class of 2010 and 2011. In all, 113 criminal background checks have been conducted for the new and returning students in the class of 2010. There were no detected infractions. Criminal background checks for the Class of 2011 will be conducted the week of August 6, 2007. For the first time, FBI criminal background checks were conducted for all of the third year students. Results of these checks will be returned to the Admissions Office and then given to the Academic Affairs Office for reference by the OU-COM clinical affiliates.

OU-COM Admissions and the Department of Communication at COM worked closely on a number of projects. In addition the Admissions Office and the Department of Communication collaborated with the

University Marketing and Communication Department on a number of innovative projects. An account of collaborative activities and projects can be found on page .

Professional presentations conducted by the OU-COM Admissions Office included sessions with various professional organizations. The external groups include the American Association of Colleges of Osteopathic Medicine (AACOM) and the West Virginia College and University Admissions Directors Group. Professional development programming was also provided to the Student Professional Support and Relations (SPSR) unit on the OU-COM campus and to various faculty of the CORE. Detailed information regarding these activities and professional achievements can be found on page .

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The summary included in this report is an overview of the Admissions Office activities that have taken place throughout the 2006/2007 academic year. PreMed Advisor Open House

The following recruitment activity information reflects proactive programming to reinforce and enhance the position of OU-COM and the profession of osteopathic medicine with important constituent groups that influence future applicants to the college.

On October 7, 2005, the OU-COM Office of Admissions hosted its first Open House for PreMed Advisors. A total of 183 invitations went out to all premedical advisors in Ohio and advisors within our geographic area. Activities for this open house included a mini-information fair during registration, an OMT demonstration, a buffet luncheon with students from the advisor's institution (when possible), information sessions on predoctoral and graduate medical education, research, faculty/student panel, admissions topics and a tour of OU-COM and the Edison Biotechnology Center.

The open house was made possible through funds from the Dean's Office. A budget of \$4,000 was given for implementation of this program. The PreMed Advisor Open House came in \$1,250.52 under budget. 7 Ohio advisors attended the event, and while the attendance was much lower than expected, we were able to spend a lot of quality time with these advisors and they left knowing more about OU-COM and osteopathic medicine than ever before.

Evaluations revealed that the program content was appropriate, but the timing of the event was inconvenient. Advisors who could not attend cited budget constraints and some felt that an open house for students would be more beneficial. At this time, another Open House is not being planned for 2006 but another advisor event for 2007 might be a possibility.

SNMA Board of Directors Meeting and Leadership Development Series

In January 2006, the OU-COM Office of Admissions had the unique opportunity to become a major sponsor of the Student National Medical Association's Board of Directors Meeting and Leadership Development Series. In an effort to support the college's mission of diversity and to support the efforts of Tyree Winters, OMS III and SNMA Region V Director, the Office of Admissions and the CORE collaborated on funding for this event. OU-COM provided the keynote speaker (Dr. Calvin James) and sponsored the opening night's dinner, as well as had student and staff participation in many panel discussions. The Office of Admissions and CORE representative Joseph Scherer also participated in the medical school and residency recruitment fair component of this meeting.

The Office of Admissions was given permission by the Dean to utilize the unspent \$1,250.52 from the PreMed Advisor Open House to help sponsor the dinner. The CORE office also generously provided \$1,400 for the dinner. The Office of Admissions also contributed an additional \$907.23 from its own recruitment budget to fully cover the total cost of the dinner, which was \$3,557.75.

Attendance at this event was not as substantial as expected with less than 100 students participating. However, OU-COM was able to build some excellent relationships with SNMA students from Tennessee, Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky and the SNMA organization as a whole. The Admissions Office was able to see immediate results from our participation in the program as a group of 6 Michigan State University MAPS students came to OU-COM for an overnight visit in April, 2006.

As OU-COM students continue to earn leadership positions within the SNMA organization, we anticipate greater exposure and opportunities to result from this partnership.

The Summer Scholars program has experience a long tradition of success at OU-COM. This year, 2007, was the first year that the program was housed in the Admissions Office. A total of 25 participants started the program. There were 2 students that decided to leave Summer Scholars shortly after the start of the program. The students cited personal reasons for their early departure.

A total of 16 of the 23 participants interviewed for admission to the Class of 2012 at OU-COM. The decisions rendered included 5 accepts, 10 alternates and 1 rejection. Of the 7 students that did not interview 5 indicated they would be applying for the fall of 2008 and 2 indicated that they will be making application for the fall of 2009.

The two open post baccalaureate positions for the fall of 2007 were filled by two of the interviewees, one URM and one Appalachian/SE Ohio student.

Tish Lyte, Assistant Director for Multicultural Recruitment and Summer Scholars Program coordinator, along with Michelle Pendergast, Administrative Assistant, and the OU-COM Admissions Office, did a terrific job running the Summer Scholars program this year. The OU-COM Biomedical Science faculty, Clinical faculty, and OU-COM student TA's and group facilitators, provided an outstanding academic experience for the program participants.

MCAT Mailing

An electronic message, including a letter and link to the OU-COM web site, was sent to the entire list of April 2006 MCAT test takers. A total of 18,285 people were contacted. A total of 7,200 minority test takers were electronically sent information discussing the OU-COM support for multicultural students with a link to the Summer Scholars site. In addition, a select number of minority test takers, 188 in total, were electronically sent specific information on Summer Scholars with links to the site and application materials in an effort to encourage application and participation.

Prematriculation Summary

2006/2007

PreCOM

The following prematriculation activity information reflects dynamic programming that is designed to enhance the dissemination of information to accepted students, their families and significant others. The intent of the program was to provide support and insight to the incoming students while reinforcing their decision to attend OU-COM.

In January 2007, the Offices of Admissions Student Affairs, Academic Affairs and the Communications collaborated on the pre-orientation event, PreCOM. PreCOM is designed as a day long event for accepted students and their families to come to campus for the purposes of getting to know their future classmates, to take care of matriculation issues such as housing, roommates, financial aid, white coat fittings and to give parents, spouses and significant others support and advice regarding their loved ones' new role as a student doctor. Students were also given information on the immersion, another curricular overview, criminal background checks, immunizations and titers and basic life support training.

There were two PreCOM events planned for the class of 2011. The first event was held on March 10 and the second on April 21. A total of 111 people attended the March 10 PreCOM (48 incoming students and 60 parents, spouses and significant others). A total of 105 people attended the April 21 PreCOM (49 incoming students and 56 parents, spouses, and significant others). At our peak enrollment on April 17, we had 121 students accepted into the class and 99 of those accepted attended PreCOM. To date a total of 14 students who attended PreCOM eventually withdrew from OU-COM prior to July 1. The yield for those attending PreCOM and eventually matriculating in August will be reported after August 1.

Evaluation from students, parents, spouses and significant others were overwhelmingly positive. Comments from students included: "Helpful to get things figured out before orientation". "It helped me out and definitely calmed some of my anxieties about starting". Comments from the parents, spouses, significant others included: "Definitely lots of personal attention, lots of questions answered". "Nice opportunity to get acquainted with the school". "Nice lunch". "Worth the trip".

Based on evaluations and OU-COM staff feedback, it has been determined that PreCOM continued to be a worthwhile event and will continue to operate as a joint venture between the Offices of Admissions and Student Affairs. Planning for PreCOM 2008 will begin in October 2007.

COMrade Program

The OU-COM Admissions Office coordinated the annual COMrade program. A total of 90 OMSI students volunteered to be COMrades for the Class of 2011. The COMrade program is designed as a prematriculation program that encourages and assists new students in their transition to OU-COM. Assignment are made in May and 2nd year students interface with the incoming students to answer questions and provide insight into the OU-COM experience. The COMrade experience continues after new student's matriculation and is a relationship that can be beneficial throughout ones medical education.

Professional Presentations and Achievements

John Schriener, Director of Admissions and Jill Harman, Associate Director, presented at the national meeting of the AAMC in Washington, D.C. in November of 2005 on Electronic Communication and Chat Rooms. This program presentation was in conjunction with the Associate Dean and Director of Admissions from the University of Michigan School of Medicine. The AACOM Annual Meeting also provided a venue for presentations by both the Director and Associate Director of Admissions on the challenges associated with the issue of increasing class sizes and competition for the recruitment of osteopathic medical students. Associate Director, Jill Harman, also presented to the Alumni Affairs and Development group at the AACOM meeting on issues pertaining to the Millennial Generation. The National Association of Advisors for the Health Professions (NAAHP) national meeting provided tremendous exposure for OU-COM as well. Director of Admissions, John Schriener, presented on the lead panel, Medicine Update, and was a participant on the Admissions Workshop panel with The Cornell University, Weill Medical College. An internal presentation was conducted by Jill Harman on Millennial Generation issues for the SPSR Unit in the spring of 2006.

The 2005/2006 admission year also brought solid recognition to OU-COM with the election of John Schriener to the position of Chair of the Counsel of Osteopathic Medical Admissions Officers (COMAO) within the American Association of Colleges of Osteopathic Medicine. In addition, Jill Harman was elected to the position of Vice Chair of the COMAO group within AACOM.
